At Woodcroft Heights Children's Centre, we are a welcoming, innovative and inclusive service where young children, families and community members wonder, explore, create and develop knowledge and skills so that children reach their full potential in learning, health and wellbeing.
- Specific curriculum approaches: A holistic play-based program in which children's learning and wellbeing is promoted in partnership with families and community. Our program is founded on the development of positive relationships. Children are supported to develop positive dispositions to learning through engagement in a wide range of learning experiences which extend their interests, challenge them to develop new knowledge and skills and provide opportunities for all children to experience success.

- Joint programmes/special curriculum projects: Wide ranging universal and targeted programs are available for children and families in partnership with government and non-government organisations.

- Performance Management Program: All staff engage in performance development processes in line with Department for Education policies
- Access to special support staff: A number of support staff attend the centre regularly to compliment the work undertaken by centre staff to maximise health and wellbeing outcomes for children with additional needs. Department for Education speech pathologists, psychologists, social workers and inclusive educations undertake assessments and provide support to parents and children. Inclusive Education Support and Bilingual Support Workers support children during their regular kindy sessions.

5. Centre Facilities

- Buildings and grounds: The centre is a purpose built centre which was first opened in November 1996. Extensions to the building which have enabled a change in focus from a stand alone preschool to an integrated service delivery site were opened in February 2012.
- Capacity (per session): 85 children across the preschool and occasional care rooms
- Centre Ownership: Department for Education
- Access for children and staff with disabilities: The centre has disability access

- Partnership arrangements with other groups: Centre staff work closely with Department for Education staff in the Panalatinga Partnership. Staff also work closely in partnership with a range of government and non-government organisations and agencies to deliver integrated services for young children and their families.
